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
Isn't Finland monolingual?





- Finland has two official languages (Finnish and Swedish)

 - Cross-border legal issues (e.g. marriage, birth, contracts)

- Implementation of technical solutions and business cases
- Regional sustainable waste-to-energy production (Sweden, Finland, Poland, Lithuania, Estonia, Russia)
 - Around the Gulf of Finland and the Baltic Sea
 - Focus on reduction of carbon dioxide emissions
 - Utilisation of waste from cities, farming and industry for energy purposes

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
