Potential of language technologies for PwD

- Automatic closed captioning
- Successful automatic translation of closed captions
- Text to speech
- Apps for sign language to text (multilingual)
- Haptics e.g. deafblind community
- Harmonised European Standard (ETSI: EN 301 549 v3.2.1)
- World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) Web Accessibility Initiative
- Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.1



Cognitive impairment

• WCAG 2.1:

Note that even content that conforms at the highest level (AAA) will not be accessible to individuals with all types, degrees, or combinations of disability, particularly in the cognitive language and learning areas.



Annex D (informative): It is evident that people with limited cognitive, language and learning abilities have diverse accessibility needs and preferences and that there is a need for further guidelines and standards. Research in this area is ongoing.

Literacy skills 1/2

Text alone is not the complete answer: Literacy levels in the general population in PIAAC Ca 50% levels 0-2 30-40% level 3 Minority (max 20% in Finland) levels 4/5

Data on international literacy levels from OECD Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC)



Literacy skills 2/2

- OECD report (2016) What does low proficiency in literacy really mean?
- 28% of adults scoring at or below Level 1 ranged from 5% in Japan to 28% in Italy.
- Adults proficient at Level 1 are generally able to solve reading tasks that require a knowledge of basic vocabulary, determine the meaning of short sentences and read paragraphs of text.
- => Implications for all public sector communication, not just PwD



Need for LT to help

- No silver bullet
- « easy to read » material is difficult for (many) humans to produce
- « easy to read » material is essential for the public & private sector
- How can LT help?
